60% of the 2.6 billion people of the Commonwealth are under the age of 30... so when the theme of tonight's event is youth leadership, this speaks directly to the majority of the Commonwealth population.

We are delighted to be joined by Nahjae Nunes, and we look forward to hearing your perspective as co-chair of the Commonwealth Youth Forum.

Here in the City of London, we are working with the Royal Commonwealth Society on several projects where young people are promoting a sustainable future.

The City Corporation's Natural Environment Board recently established the Youth Natural Environment Board, composed of students and alumni from across the City of London family of schools.

They are working with the RCS on the Clean Oceans Plastics campaign, where the City of London will host the UK leg of the Oceans and Rivers Relay next year.

And they are supporting the inaugural RCS UK academic conference at St Mary's University in Twickenham.

This year's Commonwealth Youth Forum was guided by the phrase "*Matimatiga* for a stronger tomorrow", using the Samoan word for imprint - as we should all consider what imprint we will leave on the natural environment and in the lives of others across the Commonwealth. For our part, the City of London will continue to welcome our High Commissioners and support our Commonwealth institutions, so that as one Commonwealth, we build One Resilient Common Future.
